General info

1. Lectures

The lectures will be held by two of the invited speakers as a team. Rather than giving two separate lectures, we will ask the speakers to engage with each other's work and present their theses as a dialogue rather than a 'classical' lecture. The lecture will be open to public, as many colleagues have expressed their interest in the themes of the summer school.

2. Panels

After the lectures, the group will be split up into two subgroups (12-14 participants each) in order to create a constructive working atmosphere evolving around the paper presentations. Each group will be headed by one of the lecturers. The parallel panel sessions start off with a text-based discussion focusing on assigned readings by the respective lecturer. Afterwards, the papers will be presented by a coparticipant in order to ensure engagement with each other's work. Paper presentations will be max. 10 minutes, leaving 35 minutes of discussion for each paper. The invited speakers will provide a short feedback on each paper. At the end of each thematic panel, there will be 45 minutes for a final discussion. The invited speakers will provide a 5-10 minute summary of the main questions discussed in the panel and raise cross-cutting issues which will also serve as a reference for the book publication.

3. Questions and Answers

The Q&A session aims at providing a space where participants can pose questions to the invited speakers as well as to Prof. Dilger and Prof. Hardon that go beyond the discussions in the thematic panels, for example regarding research methodology and career decisions. Each professor will talk to a small group of 2-3 participants at a time. The organizers will pre-arrange groups based on the research interests of the participants. After 45 minutes, students will switch, ensuring that each participant has the opportunity to engage in a conversation with two different professors.

4. Field Trip

The field trip will allow participants, lecturers, and organizers to engage with each other and the themes of the summer school beyond the standard format of paper presentations and discussions. Participants will have the opportunity to translate some of the concepts discussed in

the lectures and workshops into ethnographic inquiry. Groups of 8-10 people will explore Berlin's healthcare landscape through pre-organized interviews and participant observation (see working program).

5. Group Discussions with Practitioners

The group discussions add yet another facet to the learning experience of the summer school. There will be three parallel group discussions. We will invite 3-6 guests from outside academia (NGOs, governmental agencies, health care providers) who will discuss predefined questions with the participants and the lecturers. The goals are to relate theoretical concepts of medical anthropology to the provision of health care in various settings, and to transfer medical anthropological knowledge to actors outside academia. A summary of each discussion will be shared online to ensure that each participant can profit from all three group discussions.

6. Final Discussion

The final discussion will weave together some of the main questions and theses that came out of the four thematic panels, the results of the field trip, and the group discussions. The final discussion will also provide valuable input for the structure and content of the edited volume.

7. Workshop on Publishing Strategies

Publishing an edited volume/supporting participants in publishing their papers in peer-reviewed journals constitutes one of the main goals of the summer school. The invited speaker for the workshop, Lenore Manderson, has been editor of one of the most renowned medical anthropology journals, *Medical Anthropology* (Taylor and Francis) since 2010.
